College football
quarterback and Delta
brother Mike Barrow
will be honored during
a November 12, 2011,
public event on the
college campus.

The Mike Barrow
Study Room in
Nicholson Library will
be dedicated in an
hour-long program
originating in the
library's Austin
Reading Room. It will
start about 4 p.m., after
conclusion of the Lewis
& Clark at Linfield
AT&T Hall of Fame
football game, which
has a 1 p.m. kickoff.

Barrow graduated in 1968 from Linfield and

in 1963 from
Prineville's Crook
County High School. At
age 23, he died June
23, 1969, in combat in
Vietnam serving with
the U.S. Army.

He lettered in
Linfield football for the
1964, 1965 and 1967
seasons. Barrow
"quarterbacked" the
1967 Linfield football
team which upset the
University of Hawai'i,
15-13, in Honolulu,
before a crowd of
20,000, the most ever to
see a Linfield game.

Taking part in the program, organized by Barrow's Linfield football teammates, will be his sister, Mary Gail Barrow, Portland. His parents Missionary Baptist Elder Eugene and Myrna Barrow and brother, Gerald ("Jerry"), a Linfield grad, are deceased.

When the library opened in 2003, it included the study room named for Barrow thanks to a fund-raising effort led by the late Ken Williams, former Linfield faculty athletic representative and registrar.

369 College Avenue report

The 369 College Avenue, Inc. Board of Directors (the "board") has met several times over the past year with the Delta Psi Delta fraternity officers and some of the general membership. The board continues to be very pleased with the enthusiasm of the Delta fraternity members. It appears that membership will be down a little this fall but, according to the fraternity members and younger Delta alumni, this has happened before and there is no need for immediate concern.

As you are probably aware, the function of the board is to manage the fraternity house. As part of that, we oversee the maintenance of the house and the payment of the real property taxes and insurance. This spring, the board met and tried to prioritize the obvious maintenance matters which need to be undertaken. Those matters, in order of priority were: repair the roof leak over the chapter meeting room; replace the door leading to the deck; repair the deck and install a railing; and, in the chapter meeting room, clean the fireplace, complete painting, lay new carpeting, and purchase new furniture. Other maintenance matters include setting up the

downstairs laundry room for two washers and two dryers, and repairing the downstairs bathroom.

The good news is that it appears at this time as though the roof is not actually leaking. So, no roof repair will be necessary at this time and we can move directly into installing the railing, which will make our insurance company very happy! The next major item will be the replacement of the door leading to the deck and, ultimately, replacement of all of the fire doors. With regard to updating the interior of the chapter meeting room, you may be aware that the board established the Delta Psi Delta Renovation Fund which has now received \$2,225 in contributions. We intend to use those funds to purchase and install new carpeting and purchase new furniture for the room, repair a broken door, paint the walls, and hire a chimney sweep to clean the fireplace so that it can be used without smoking up the room. Hopefully, if these costs exceed the \$2,225.00 we have received, the chapter's budget can cover the difference. The current plan is to begin the improvements to the chapter meeting room in the next week or so, so that they will be

completed in time for fall rush.

The 369 College Avenue, Inc. board sincerely appreciates the generosity of the alumni who have contributed to the renovation fund. The Delta spirit is clearly evident in the Delta alumni and fraternity brothers on campus who pull together on these projects to perpetuate the fraternalism that has brought us all together in the first place. And I personally want to thank the 369 College Avenue, Inc. Board of Director members: Wally Karstad, Alan Hubka, Mike Reed, Mike Chapman, Ron Johnston, and Tom Sherwood; and the "elder statesmen", such as Larry Baker, Lee Paulson, John Gardiner and countless others, for their support.

Greetings from the Delta Psi Delta Education Foundation!

We are excited for the upcoming Linfield school year and what lies ahead for the Delta Psi Delta and the education foundation. Things have been relatively quiet from us recently as we have been going through a transition as several former members were no longer able to participate in the foundation. I would like to thank the outgoing President and Chair, Ryan Langdon for his service over the last two years in getting the foundation started. Currently, the foundation is made up of six members:

Our current goal is to reach \$150,000 over the next three years. Through some very generous donations from current members, at this time we have over \$20,000 in the education fund. With this I am happy to announce that for the second year we will be providing two scholarships of \$600 each. One to the member with the highest GPA for 2010/2011 as well as to the member noted as providing the most service to Delta Psi Delta as nominated by current

Where did they go?

Todd Gilmore, Jr. came to Linfield for his Junior and Senior years after two years at Oregon State. He graduated with a B.A. in Physics in 1966. Upon acquiring a job at Battelle Memorial Institute in Richland, WA, Todd began his career while pursuing a PhD in theoretical physics at Washington State Univ. He completed his dissertation, which dealt with violation of super selection rules in quantum theory, and received his Ph.D. in 1977. While at Battelle, Todd's area of work was very specialized (as was his whole career!), primarily in high peak power ultra short pulse solid state laser development. He also did

some work in gas transport laser development.

Todd moved on to work for McDonnell Douglas in Huntington Beach, CA

where he worked on electro-optics, infrared sensor test and calibration. In this work he was involved with infrared signature measurement and worked at a test facility where they calibrated the electronic sensors of ballistic missile interceptors on a program called Homing Overlay Experiment (HOE). The actual testing took place on the Kwajalein Atoll, where the interceptors were launched from an island in the north part of the chain and were designed to provide detection, tracking and discrimination of ICBM re-entry vehicles. As a new PH.D., Todd was placed into sink or swim situations of troubleshooting anomalies in the calibration of these sensors. It was his first real exposure to high levels in corporate and military circles, and, as Todd says, "it was really fun, but at times quite Intimidating".

Todd ultimately became the Manager of Technology Development and Applications at Lockheed Martin, where he was responsible for overseeing the development of theory, development of computers and computational methods, development of new, very low observable test facilities, and fielding covert advanced tests to validate concepts..... Stealth. He funded unclassified R&D in universities to develop advanced theory, and recruited a host of PhDs to work in his department. He hired chemists, solid state physicists, mathematicians, electronic engineers, and "any number of wonderful prima donnas working for me in what is called a black program. We didn't exist; our buildings were not identified, and we could not acknowledge any affiliations whatsoever." This work led to wide-ranging cooperation with other black programs within, and outside the company, that was equally exciting.

Todd's pursuit of excellence began at a very young age. He was born in Colon, Panama, and grew up in Portland, OR, Carmel, CA, and graduated from Palm Springs H.S. in 1960. In 1958 he won third place in the International Science Fair for an ion engine design and construction. Linus Pauling was one of the judges in the California Fair, and it was a thrill for Todd to meet him.

Today Todd, and his wife, Yvette, a retired RN, spend their time baking sourdough bread, cooking, making trails and mountain biking. He is



especially proud of a 2nd place Port Townsend




